

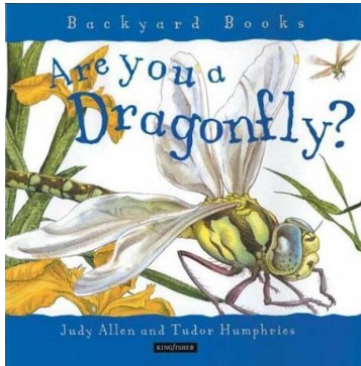

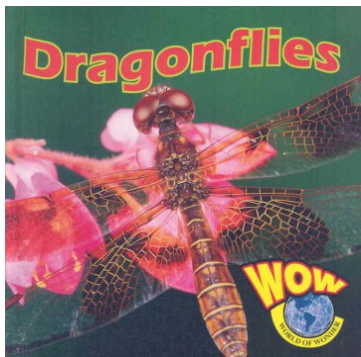
Very young children will discover the secrets of metamorphosis as they enjoy a story of the life of a familiar backyard creature, the dragonfly.

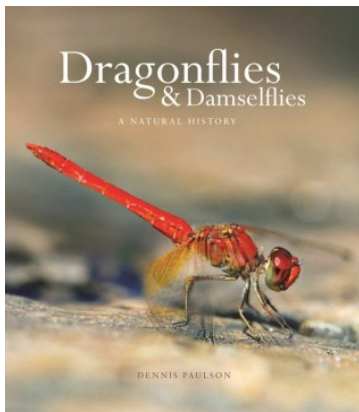

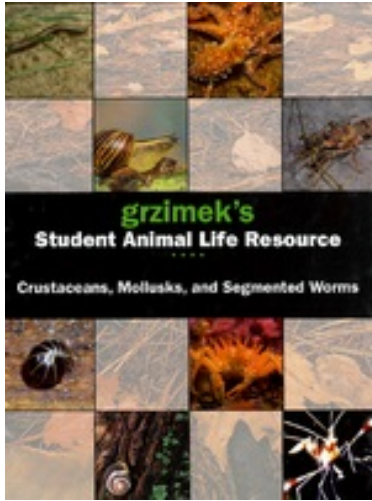

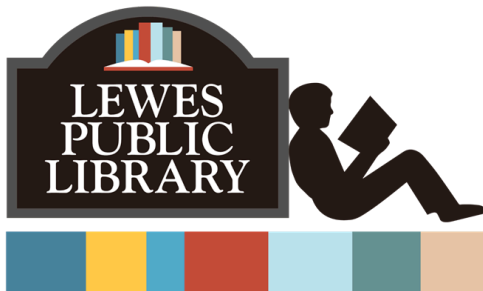
